It is fitting for this country, cradle of Islam, to bestow a prize for service to Islam. Service to Islam originated in this land at the dawn of Islam. It was invigorated, in a general sense, by Imam Muhammad bin Saud and his successors, through embracing Shaikh Muhammad bin

Abd Al-Wahab's call for Islamic reform. With the advent of a modern Saudi Arabia, the late King Abd Al-Aziz bin Abd Al-Rahman Al-Faisal and his sons relentlessly supported the teachings, laws, language and cultural heritage of Islam. We look forward to continuing along this path.

The King Faisal International Prize is an expression of the spirit of service to Islam and a pointer to the progress this country has accomplished under its wise leadership.
