Speech by Professor Wael Hallaq

Bismillahi al-Rahman al-Rahim,

Your Majesty, Khadim al-Haramayn al-Sharifayn, King Salman b. Abd al-Azizi; Honorable Committee members of King Faisal Prize; distinguished guests, respected scholars, and fellow attendees,

I want also to express my gratitude to my family members without whose exemplarity and support I would not be standing here today.

I wish to acknowledge that I stand on the shoulders of numerous giants, without whom I would not have learned much. It is often my feeling that the old adage, "there is nothing new under the sun," is so very true, and so it is my conviction that I am a small part of a cycle of intellectual life that works with an inexplicable dialectic. Without talent and inspiration, also inexplicable, we have no hope of intellectual and artistic achievement, and so I am extremely grateful for whatever I have been endowed with, and for any hand that lent me help. I never take any of these for granted.

The power of such awards transcends the limits of time. It is an acknowledgement of past work, in my case more than four decades of labor, but it is also an exhilarating moment of the present. For me, it is the encouragement that feeds the soul which is the most significant, encouragement to continue my work with vigor, and in pursuance of the higher goals that I set myself a long time ago.
